

Southwestern Arizona

It is sometime green, sometime brown and brittle. It always has fabulous mountain colorations which change with the clouds and sun moving across the sky during the day. Grand vistas to view and try to photograph. If you are lucky, you can find blooming plants and wildlife moving around. It is a favorite area for me. I am talking about the part of Arizona which begins in Quartzite (17 miles east of Blythe, CA), east to Phoenix, south to Tombstone, and west to Yuma. 

- Your username for first time access is the first part of the email address you had in the old VMS. So anything before the '@' symbol. All have the same one use password. Garden4Life\$ you should be prompted to change your password. (Username too, if you want)
- Once you have changed your password you should be prompted to sign in again using new password. Once signed in, go to the Get Help tab on the menu across the top of page. Scroll to the Tutorial Videos. View first video for basic user information. This will show how to enter hours. It compares the new and old system.
